Homework Policy (last reviewed in 2024)

Rationale:

The aim of this statement is to clarify for parents and teachers the policy and procedures regarding formal homework so that children may benefit from the work undertaken. In formulating this statement, the following points have been considered.

- 1. Whilst excessive homework may make too many demands on the child and create stress and antagonism which in turn affects the child's natural pleasure in learning, homework does forge a powerful link between home and school and between teachers and parents by extending the child's learning from classroom to home.
- 2. Homework is the point where classroom and living room overlap. When parents take an active interest in the child's homework this may encourage the child to work to the best of their potential.
- 3. The role of parents in their children's education must not be underestimated. There is immense value in parents reading to children and both conversations and discussions are extremely important.
- 4. Together our aim should be to develop their powers of observation and exploit their natural curiosity. Much of this would be a worthwhile substitute for formal homework.
- 5. Where applicable, parents are also actively involved in 'Paired Reading'/ Paired Mathematics' projects at home annually.
- 6. Termly year group information booklets give parents a guide in relation to topics to be covered etc. and introductory meetings at the start of the year outline practice/expectations.

Policy:

Sustaining varied, interesting homework on a night-to-night basis with a class of mixed-ability children is an almost impossible task so, homework on a regular basis may include spelling, reading, written work and tables with along with the consolidation of mathematical concepts and literacy skills being worked on in class. Homework therefore consolidates classwork. (Literacy includes: - Grammar/Punctuation, Comprehension and Writing) Homework should be completed nightly and brought in each morning*.

When appropriate, homework may also consist of research work, observation or creative work associated with topics/projects which children are studying. (*When research homework is set, additional time may be given.)

All homework set must marked/assessed at the earliest opportunity. Where online work is set, pupils are expected to complete on the night set and teachers acknowledge completion by return work online with a comment or by keeping a record of progress on commercial sites such as Education City or Studyladder.

The use of diaries is standardised throughout the school. Parents and teachers are encouraged to use the diary as a method of communication for relaying messages about pastoral and curriculum issues. Homework tasks are recorded by children into the homework diaries (three distinctive styles complement FS, KS1 and KS2). Standardised diaries are used from P3 and up. P3 pupils start to self–record in term 2 so that by third term in P3 many children should be writing the planned homework into the diary by themselves (on a weekly basis).

Parents are encouraged to sign the diaries and teachers monitor and sign them regularly. Supporting information other weekly information as well as the homework timetable may also be posted on Google Classroom or the Home Learning page of the school website where appropriate.

Children are advised to develop good study habits in all age groups i.e. do homework at a set time, in a suitable place without distractions (away from screens) and sitting at a table to write. (The homework diaries contain tips for parents/children). Excessive use of sheets is avoided – booklets may be used for differentiated groups.

Some formal homework is set for children in P1 and P2.

Parents are encouraged to talk with their children, read library books to them and provide opportunities for creative play.

Reading is to be an enjoyable experience as over-emphasis on reading homework in the initial stages may have a negative result.

Children in P3 and P4 should not be expected to spend more than 20 minutes on an evening's homework.

This time will be gradually increased as pupils get older to a maximum of 45 minutes in P7.

The amount of homework set in each year should prepare children for the following year to avoid any sudden change or increase in what is expected.

No homework will be set at weekends or during school holidays however, P6 and P7, for part of the year, may be given weekend homework.

Parents are asked to limit the time children spend on homework (this can vary from child to child). When satisfied that he/she has spent enough time, allow the child to stop and initial the work. By doing this, children will have the opportunity to share in normal family life and pursue interests not directly connected with school.
